MASS INCARCERATION INITIATIVE

Daniela Kantorova, our president Elect, is spearheading a conference at the Wright Institute to address the problems of mass incarceration. This conference is inspired by the Anti Police-Terror Project's work with the family of Dujuan Armstrong Jr, who was murdered in Alameda County Jail in June 2018. With direct ties to the PsySR Racial Justice Statement released in 2016, one aim of the conference is to strategize mental health professionals' involvement in elminating torture in US prisons and jails. Also in developmental stages is an instructional <u>video addressing the ethical</u> <u>dilemma of dual loyalties for health care providers in the current prison system.</u> The authors are Martha Davis, Alice LoCicero, and Ian Hansen. Dr. LoCicero will present this work on Friday afternoon 8/9/19 in the PsySR suite at the APA convention in Chicago between 1 PM and 4 PM.

We hope to increase our collaboration with the dedicated group, Social Workers Against Solitary Confinement. Moya Atkinson of SWASC has been in regular contact with us to link us with their work. We welcome others in this initiative.
